Coos Bay Celebrates "Children's Day" With Our Sister City Choshi, Japan

"Koinobori", also known as carp windsocks, carp streamers, and/or carp banners, decorate the landscape of Japan from April through early May in honor of "Children's Day Festival" ("Kodomo nu hi") on May 5th of each year. In Japanese culture, the carp symbolizes courage and great strength because of its ability to swim up a waterfall. Children's Day is celebrated as an event expressing hope that children will grow up healthy and strong like wild carps. During this festival, people set up a warrior doll or a yoroi armor set in the house and Koinobori ("Flying Carp") windsocks outside the house.

Joe and Toni Hudson, who recently retired and moved to Coos Bay, obtained 11 carp windsocks with the hopes that they could be flown over or near the "Morning Song" bridge in Mingus Park in celebration of "Children's Day" with Choshi Japan, our sister city. Joe and Toni worked with Beverly Myers, caretaker of Choshi Gardens in Mingus Park, and City Staff to put in place the carp windsocks. The carp windsocks will be displayed for a week, and this is anticipated to be an annual event.

Saturday, April 30th was the Coos Bay Volunteer Firefighter's Annual Awards Banquet, and there were several people honored for their contribution to the department. Those receiving the 2015 Outstanding Service Award for their effort above and beyond the job description included Kevin Cunningham, Jason Guenther, Ben Rolicheck, Steve Takis, and Donna White. Frank Kaiser received an award for his attendance at the most fires for an impressive 5th year in a row. The volunteer firefighter with the most documented training hours in 2015 was Gabe Ouellette, and the career firefighter with the most training time of 191 hours was Luke Taylor.

The top honor of 2015 went to Volunteer Firefighter Gabe Ouellette. Gabe is a newcomer to the Coos Bay Fire Department having joined in February of 2015. He has some previous experience at North Bend and SWOCC, but he has really been a benefit to Coos Bay this past year. Gabe has displayed enthusiasm, strong work ethic, and commitment. He is a building contractor by trade, but he really enjoys his role as a firefighter. His integrity and character also helped him earn the distinction of 2015 Firefighter of the Year.



A New Face at City Hall

Jan Kerbo has recently joined the Public Works team at the City of Coos Bay. She is a registered engineer with over 25 years of experience. Her primary responsibility will be managing the construction of Wastewater Treatment Plant No. 2 for the next few years. By hiring her directly, the City has someone onsite full time representing the City. This is a significant cost savings as opposed to hiring consultants.



She brings to the City her extensive experience with wastewater construction projects, SRF loan funding, municipal facilities planning, and working with the state and federal agencies involved. By engaging the contractor in the cost efficiency process, she has consistently brought projects in under budget and at times below the bid cost. Jan is also well known for her involvement with local community service projects, and she has been a Coos Bay resident since 1977.

K-9 Tron Retires

After 11 plus years working as a Police K-9 Handler, Sergeant Sean Merritt is turning in his leash and his faithful partner K-9 Tron. Sgt. Merritt is the last of three officers that were instrumental in the resurrection of the Coos Bay Police Department (CBPD) Patrol K-9 program back in 2005. During his career, Sgt. Merritt handled K-9 Vico and K-9 Tron full time while testing and evaluating several other police K-9's. Over the years, Sgt. Merritt and his K-9 partners have been called upon to assist in locating not only wanted criminals but also lost children and elderly citizens.



In 2007, Sergeant Merritt and K-9 Vico received a Life Saving Award after they were called to assist the Coquille Police Department in locating an elderly female who was suffering with dementia who had walked away from her home.

After K-9 Vico's retirement in 2012, Sgt. Merritt was assigned as the handler for CBPD's new K-9 "Tron". Since that time, Sgt. Merritt and K-9 Tron have assisted in locating and capturing subjects involved in several high profile cases in Coos Bay and the surrounding area. With Sgt. Merritt turning in the leash, it will also mean the retirement of K-9 Tron who will continue to live with Sgt. Merritt and his family.

Training to Keep Children Safe

Coos Bay Fire Department recently hosted a Child Passenger Safety Technician Training put on by Safe Kids Worldwide. This three-day course consisted of classroom and hands on training culminating with a Child Safety Seat clinic. Two personnel from Coos Bay Fire Department completed the training and became Certified Child Passenger Safety Technicians.





These two Technicians will now be available for drop in questions at the fire station, and they will assist with the monthly Child Safety Seat Clinics held at the Coos Bay Fire Station, 450 Elrod Avenue on the second Tuesday of each month from 11:00 am until 1:00 pm. This clinic is put on by the Coos County Child Safety Seat Coalition which is comprised of members from local law enforcement, ODOT, Oregon Department of Human Services, and Bay Area Hospital. If you have any questions regarding Child Safety Seats or would like to make sure that yours is installed correctly, please stop by the next clinic on May 10th from 11:00 am until 1:00 pm, or call the Fire Department at 541-269-1191 and talk to one of our new Technicians.
