ANNUAL SAFE TRICK-OR-TREAT FUN – The Coos Bay Downtown Association will be hosting their Annual Downtown Halloween Trick-or-Treat event. This is where businesses, churches, and other groups will be handing out candy to trick-or-treaters from their decorated vehicles.



WORKING TOGETHER FOR THE BENEFIT OF OUR GREATER COMMUNITY

With the awareness of our capabilities and limited resources for handling a large scale emergency, the Fire Chief's from Coos Bay, North Bend, Charleston, and North Bay have been meeting regularly to discuss increased cooperation through training and emergency response. The four departments have conducted a joint training event each quarter with each department taking a turn hosting the drill. Training topics have included: Technical Rope Rescue, Commercial Fire Operations, Water Supply Operations, and this week, Coos Bay hosted a Mass Casualty Incident at Marshfield High School.

Wednesday's mutual aid drill had firefighters responding to a simulated bus accident with 72 victims. Athletes from the varsity football team were assigned an injury and spread across the baseball infield. Firefighters were to assign degrees of urgency (triage) to the patients into four categories, provide treatment to stabilize patients, and coordinate with the area hospitals, ambulances, and bus companies to get the victims to the appropriate care facility. Thirty-three firefighters from the four fire departments were able to coordinate the triage, field care, and transportation of all victims from the scene in just over an hour.

We learned from this exercise that we can provide order to chaos. While this is not a situation that we often handle, many of the incident management principles that we utilize on the fire scene can be successfully applied to a mass-casualty incident. During our post-incident debriefing, it was noted that this inter-agency cooperation and familiarization has had a positive influence on our efficiency. All of our communities benefit from joint training, communication, and cooperation.
